

2016 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Introduction

In its 21st year, the Society continued to blossom in 2016 and achieved many good things, and Modernians collectively again proved to be one of Perth Modern School's most valuable assets.

At last year's AGM the Principal, Lois Joll, on behalf of the School acknowledged what she called "The amazing work of the Society and the History Centre". She said it is important for students to follow examples and to recognise and give back and contribute to society.

Overview of 2016 activities

Governance

Since the 2016 AGM in April 2016, the Council comprised Peter Farr (President), Eve Broadley (Hon. Treasurer), Deborah Beresford (Hon. Secretary), Sallie Davies, Barrie Baker, Dr Irene Froyland, Ian Jarvis (Communications), Barbara Mallett, Prof. Geoffrey Soutar (from Nov 2016) and Ed Lazarus (from June 2016). Bruce McCallum resigned due to a timing conflict with his work and former Vice President Annemie McAuliffe was granted leave-of-absence for the period from May 2016 to the 2017 AGM. The Council has operated without any Vice Presidents since the 2016 AGM. Dr Irene Froyland was elected to represent the Society on the PMS Board. Lois Joll (Principal) reported to Council meetings about school activities/achievements and issues, and on some occasions was represented by Val Furphy or Steve Jurilj.

I sincerely thank all Councillors for their dedicated efforts.

Initiatives in 2016

The Council commenced/progressed several initiatives including:

- Revision of the Constitutions for the Perth Modernian Society Inc and the Sphinx Foundation Inc:
- Drafting a Constitution for the proposed Perth Modernian Society History Museum Foundation Inc.
- Encouraging Modernians to be involved in the fundraising for a proposed 700-seat multipurpose state-of-the-art auditorium.
- Re-order of Perth Modernian Society memorabilia: watches and men's ties, and approval of the design for a lady's scarf.
- The Perth Modern School administration requested contact details of members for occasionally sending out information about events and developments, and the Council agreed on an opt out policy if members do not want to share their contact details with the School.

Perth Modernian Society Awards in 2016

Barrie Baker and Ian Jarvis were recommended for the award of Modernian Fellow. Alan Porter and Deborah Beresford were recommended for the award of Moderna Scola, and Alison Woodman was made an Honorary Member of the Perth Modernian Society. The awards comprising a Certificate and trophy were presented by the President at the Annual Reunion in September, and Alison Woodman received her award at a Volunteers Morning Tea in December. The names of Barrie and Ian have been gold lettered onto the Modernian Fellows Board in the McCusker Room and the names of Alan and Deborah have been added as inaugural awardees on a new Moderna Scola Board, and similarly for Alison's name on a new Honorary Members Board; the two latter boards are in the History Centre.

The Society worked cooperatively with the School administration, P&C Association and the School Board.

'A Celebration of contribution: Tales of the courage, commitment and creativity of Modernians 1911-1963'.

The Society applauds the School for commissioning and producing an impressive book of biographies featuring 160 Modernians, and which was launched by the School's Patron **Malcolm McCusker** AC CVO CitWA QC in June 2016.

The major helpers on the project were Roger Stubbs, Alison Woodward, Verity Albert and Sallie Davies who researched, wrote, edited and sourced material and photos. This is the third in a series of history books written about PMS.

Annual Oration

Distinguished Modernian **Professor Lesley Parker AM FTSE** presented the sixth Annual Oration to senior students and visitors in November 2016 on the topic *'Reflections on being a Modernian'*. Lesley and her husband spent time with students over morning tea following her presentation. Letters were sent to previous people who had given the Annual Oration keeping them informed of the Perth Modernian Society Annual Oration for 2016: Michael Kirby, Kevin Parker, Janet Holmes a' Court, Phillip Playford and Shirley Randell.



Reunions

Numbers at the **Annual Reunion** in Sept. 2016 were swelled by the attendance of around 30 from the 1956 Class Reunion. Thanks go to Guest MC **Rebecca Dollery**, student 1999-2003, of ABC fame for her part in the auditorium program.

Thank you also to **Annemie McAuliffe** and **Irene Froyland** for their efforts to provide an information service for organisers of class/year reunions. The enthusiasm for these events appears to be

increasing. Thanks go to the people who organised class reunions, and those who kept our Facebook page humming.

History Centre and Archives

The Council is thankful for the dedication of the volunteers who contributed numerous hours to the History Centre and Archives over the year. Work progressed on creating a special tax-deductible **Museum Fund**. (Refer separate report.)

Constitution Amendments

- Work commenced in 2016 on the revision of the Constitutions for the Perth Modernian Society Inc and the Sphinx Foundation Inc;
- Work commenced in 2016 on drafting a Constitution for the proposed Perth Modernian Society History Museum Foundation Inc.

Nigel Hunt, a Director of the Sphinx Foundation Board, did the principal legal work on these pro bono.

Perth Modern School Board

As an Independent Public School (IPS), Perth Modern School has a school Board comprising the Principal, parents, staff and members of the general community. Since its inception, the Society has been invited to nominate one of the Board's Community members - a role filled in 2016 by **Dr Irene Froyland**.

Membership Trends

The Society's Strategic Plan 2014-2017 focuses on the need to expand membership - especially in the post-scholarship era cohorts, and to entice more members to volunteer their services so that the workload can be spread better and so that more can be achieved where gaps have been identified.

Membership levels increased slightly once again in 2016, but regrettably a significant number of members passed away in 2016. At the end of 2016, the Society had some 818 Contributing Members, as well as some 3,600 Registered Members, making 4,408 total members. Changes in membership over the past seven years are summarised in the table below:




Fig. 1 Members' Age Distribution based on their Core Final Year

Whilst people might very often surmise that the Society's membership is very skewed towards the original scholarship school era, the year-by-year data used for Fig. 1 below shows that of 3,715 members with Core Final Year data recorded, we have 1,936 (=52%) members up to and including 1960, and 1,779 (=48%) members from 1961 onwards.

Fig 1 shows the 'age' distribution of members based on their core final year at Mod.

Finances

The Financial Statements for the Society have been prepared by the Hon. Treasurer Eve Broadley, and are to be found at pages 12-18.

External audits have not been commissioned for the Society or the Sphinx Foundation Inc. for the 2016 Financial Year.

The external audit of the Sphinx Scholarship Fund for 2016 is complete at the time of writing.

Income and Expenditure - Perth Modernian Society Inc.

In 2016, Income amounted to \$13,553 and Expenses \$11,294, giving a net Operating Profit of \$2,259, and leaving the Society with a net cash at bank at 31/12/2016 of \$19,600.

- Subscriptions yielded \$3,792 (lower than the \$4,910 in 2015).
- The main recurrent cost items comprised: Newsletters, Printing, Stationery & Postage, IT, Communications and website hosting, Insurance, trophies (i.e. Honours Awards).
- Net function cash inflows amounted to \$1,045 after payment of a donation to the Music Department as thanks for staging a memorable concert for Annual Reunion attendees.
- The Society was grateful to the School to be given the opportunity to run the football parking using the School grounds for one AFL game, which resulted in a payment of \$3,260 back to the Society. Please note that without this income, the Society would have run at a small loss for the year.

Sphinx Foundation Inc

The Council is thankful for the dedicated efforts of the Chairman and Directors of the Sphinx Foundation Inc. It is noted that the Sphinx Scholarship Fund had a record-breaking year in 2016 in terms of the number and value of scholarships and bursaries awarded to PMS students. (Refer separate report.)

Imminent Future Challenges

I very much regret to say that events leading up to and since the WA State election on 11th March 2017 have put a lot of things concerning the future status of Perth Modern School in limbo, and *ipso facto* question marks over the future roles of the Perth Modernian Society, the Sphinx Foundation, the Sphinx Scholarship Fund and the History Centre.

I assure our thousands of Members that the election outcome has not dented the collective opposition by the Perth Modernian Society, present day students, parents of students, the P&C Association, the Save Perth Mod Action Group, and the PMS Board to save Perth Modern School from the downgrade to local intake high school that the WA Government intends.

Serendipitously however, the campaign during Feb and March 2017 to save PMS, in which the Society's Council and Members at large have played a leading part, has done more to unify this organisation AND the whole Perth Mod community than anyone could possibly have dreamed of at last year's AGM. The words **Perth Mod, Perth Modern School, alumni, Modernians, philanthropy and Sphinx scholarships** have featured in the Western Australian press and airwaves on almost a daily basis in Feb and March 2017.

Conclusion

It has been a privilege to work with the Councillors, Directors and the School Executive and staff.

I sincerely thank, on members' behalf, the Society's Councillors, the H&M Committee, the Sphinx Foundation Board, many other volunteers, and special contributors for the enormous amount of work and goodwill that they put in to so many projects during 2016.

I am very pleased to have seen the 'coming of age' of Perth Modern School, the Perth Modernian Society, the History Centre, the Sphinx Foundation and the Scholarship Fund.

Naturally like so many alumni and others I am extremely disturbed at the current threat that we collectively face - and possibly in the years ahead - from WA Government's announced education policy, and I can only hope that it won't end up diminishing the fantastic work that this Society does for Perth Mod.

Governance

The Sphinx Scholarship Fund is independently audited and the Sphinx Foundation reports annually as required to the ACNC (Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission).

Constitution Amendment

The Board meeting held in July 2016 agreed that there needed to be revision of the Sphinx Foundation (Inc) Constitution for its own sake, as well as to conform with new legislative guidelines. Nigel Hunt volunteered to work on this. The Board meeting in Dec. 2016 discussed proposed amendments to the Sphinx Foundation Constitution and provided guidance to the drafter Nigel Hunt on revisions. The revision process continued into March 2017 and is being done simultaneously with revision of the Perth Modernian Society Inc. Constitution and a new Constitution for the proposed Perth Modernian Society Historical Museum Foundation (Inc).

Scholarships

With the assistance once again of Emeritus Professor Lesley Parker, the Board played a big part in the process of advertising for and selecting scholarship and bursary winners.

Scholarships paid out in FY 2016 to Peth Modern School on behalf of awardees totalled a record **\$40,240**, up from \$28,500 in FY 2015 and \$19,700 in FY 2014.



Annual Fundraising Appeal

The Annual Appeal letters were mailed out in early May 2016 and realised donations over the FY totaling \$29,000. Pledges were received for an additional \$52,000 and these funds were received in Jan. 2017. So far over 350 people have donated to the Scholarship Fund since its inception. Around \$800,000 is invested and earning interest.

Financial Reports

Sphinx Foundation

The Net Cash at bank at 31/12/2016 was \$636.

Sphinx Scholarship Fund

Notes:

- 1. Sale of shares in Colonial Notes (CNGH) realised \$46,261. New investments: \$75,000 in the Centuria Zenith Fund (unlisted property trust, A-grade office asset in Chatswood, Sydney NSW) (7.0% yield)
- 2. Net return on average investment assets for FY 2016 = 6.4%.

3. Scholarships paid out in FY 2016 to students at Perth Modern School totaled a record \$40,240, up from \$28,500 in FY 2015.

Income and Expenditure

In 2016, Sphinx Scholarship Fund income amounted to \$88,938 and Expenses \$43,650, giving a net Operating Profit of \$45,288, and leaving the Society with a net cash at bank at 31/12/2016 of \$49,321.

Balance Sheet

Sphinx Scholarship Fund Net Cash at bank at 31/12/2016 = \$49,321. Total Assets = \$774,902. Total Liabilities = Nil. Net Assets = \$774,902.

The Future

The Sphinx Foundation Board has set itself these principal targets for 2017:

- (i) Finalisation of the revised Constitution and submission to the WA Dept of Commerce.
- (ii) Sharing of the workload associated with the Scholarship Fund.
- (iii) Reaching the target for converting 3-year entry scholarships to 4 years; and creating new scholarships for middle/upper school students based on financial or other demonstrated need.
- (iv) Securing donations for academic excellence scholarships for the remaining learning areas namely Technology and Enterprise, Politics/Law, Health and Physical Education, and the Arts with the aim of promoting excellence and assist with education costs in Years 11 and 12.
- (v) Resolving if necessary the implications for the Sphinx Foundation of the WA Labor Government's' Education Central' (EC) election policy involving creating a proposed new 'Perth Academic College' for Academic Selective students in the Perth CBD, and the consequential 'repurposing' of Perth Modern School as only a local intake school from 2020.

Regarding **Item (v)**, before and since the WA State election on 11th March 2017 there has been widespread praise for the Sphinx Scholarship scheme at Perth Mod. At the time of writing, the Board is concerned about:

- Potential impact of the EC policy on Sphinx Foundation Inc., Sphinx Scholarship Fund, Annual Appeal in 2017, previous Deeds of Gift, intended/future Bequests;
- Potential impact on renewable Sphinx Scholarships then current in 2020, and Scholarships that would normally be awarded post-2020;
- The pre-election claim by Labor candidate John Carey (now MLA) that "he saw no reason why
 the scholarships would not be transferable to the (proposed) new 'Perth Academic College'
 site in the CBD".

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING METHOD

This is not a general-purpose financial report. It is a special purpose report prepared for the Members of the Society to enable compliance with requirements of the Corporation Act, the Income Tax Assessment Act 1936 and to enable compliance with requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA).

NOTE 1.

Perth Modernian Society Council organized resources to conduct the football parking for one AFL game, with the money collected going to Perth Modern School. The School subsequently contributed \$3,260 to the Society as its share of the overall income from parking in 2016.

NOTE 2.

Associations Liability Insurance, which amounted to \$905 is being paid for by the Sphinx Foundation Inc. as this insurance cover is more relevant to the Foundation's Directors' responsibilities.

HISTORICAL AND MUSEUM COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2016

The history of Perth Modern School mirrors the development of public secondary education in Western Australia. From the day the School opened the staff and students believed in the need for records and memorabilia to be preserved for future generations. They donated personal records and memorabilia for display and publication to reflect the aspirations of the founders, students, alumni, principals, staff and parents. The **Sphinx Magazines** became a valuable historical resource. In December 1973 the **PMS Historical and Museum Society** was established to honour the past and prepare for the future, engaging staff and former students in their endeavours. The Society merged into the newly established **Perth Modernian Society (Inc)** becoming the **Historical and Museum Committee** in 1995. In 2009 the **PMS History Centre and Archives** established a substantial workspace and display area.

The **Perth Modernian Society Historical and Museum Committee** continues to create an interesting and special place for the history of Perth Modern School to be available to the wider community. Volunteers, staff, students and most importantly, through dedicated fund raising we believe we can promote recognition of the past and together create a valuable resource for future learning and research, and an appetite for interest and involvement.

Dedicated constitutional change is required for the Historical and Museum Committee to seek **DGR status** to raise funds. We are currently seeking registration under the State rules as a charity, applying for DGR under federal legislation, and gain Australian charity status as a public museum. Due to family commitments original DGR working party members Annemie and Kerry McAuliffe handed over their research findings to Stephen Monterosso in January and further research was undertaken into the recent changes to constitutional requirements by State and Federal Governments. In September, Robert Johnson took over the task of preparing a draft constitution and **Objects, Purpose and Functions** of the proposed **Perth Modernian Society Historical Museum Foundation** were approved in principle for inclusion in the draft Constitution.

2016 Historical and Museum Committee

The Committee met 4 times during 2016 and reported to all Perth Modernian Society Council meetings. Occasional reports to the School Board provided brief details of our activities. Familiarisation with accessible information available in the History Centre and Archives takes place weekly when committee members join other volunteers to undertake the various activities required to maintain records, develop resources and displays. Thank you everyone involved including: Barbara Mallett, Bill MacPherson, Alison Woodman, Jim Davies, Deirdre Owen, Lesley Russell, and Roger Stubbs, Robyn White, Frank Hedges, Alan Porter, Rod Smith, Robert (Bob) Johnson, Gay Albillos, Deb Beresford, Ian Jarvis.

Activities commenced on Monday 1 February 2016. Under the direction of its creator Ian Jarvis, the **Jarvis e-XMod db (JeD)** continued to require maintenance of hardware and software as some 20,000 records were updated with relevant information regarding former staff and students of Perth Modern School submitted by interested members. This vital reference base serves and complements the **George Burvill Biographical Index** where all biographical information in hard copy is filed. **Archives** volunteers digitise detailed records of photographs and other memorabilia into the **MOSA** iC **Database**.

Gay Albillos has photocopied all **Sphinx Magazines to 1967** and these have proved popular with visitors. Gay was also responsible for the conservation and framing of the **Kirkham** weaving with the valued help of her daughter Christina Albillos who donated her time and professional conservation skills to the cause. A provisional budget for 2017 has been prepared.

Publications





On 24 June some 200 Modernians, staff, students and parents joined Perth Modern School Patron Malcolm McCusker for the launch of *A Celebration of Contribution*. The Perth Modernian Society Historical and Museum Committee, congratulates all involved in the successful completion of this very ambitious and demanding project, and thank you for sharing the journey with the **History Centre and Archive Volunteers**. The work not only improved the accuracy of records, it drew on and increased the information already held in the **George Burvill Biographical Index** and **JED (Jarvis ex-Mod Db)**, enlarged the photographic collection, and brought in visitors with new information for our records. This can only encourage others to join us to continue the work Alison Woodman and Roger Stubbs have begun as volunteers with us. The sharing of volunteer research expertise and the outcomes achieved contributed greatly to recording the history of Perth Modern School.

A final working draft for **PMS Heritage Trails** was completed and made available to the School. An electronic copy of this resource is available at the History Centre for use as a working document (NOT to be distributed) and a **hard copy** is available for viewing within the History Centre (comments are invited). Information and photographs related to Sir Arthur Amies, PMS student 1916-1920 who was Foundation Professor of Dentistry at Monash were provided for inclusion in a biography to be published in 2017. This is indicative of the many requests received during the year.

Memories from the past, recorded deaths and honours awards were provided for publication in the quarterly **Perth Modernian e-Newsletters** circulated to all **Registered** and **Contributing Members**. Thank you to all members who had **Your Say** during the year. **Contributing Members** received the **Annual Magazine for Contributing Members, which** offered more comprehensive items of interest drawn from the archives and volunteer contributors. Donors for **Year 12 awards** and **Sphinx Foundation Scholarship** were also recognised. Career/Employment lists 2011-16 were generated from **JeD** for the **2016 Annual Reunion display** and all previous research remains ongoing

Barrie Baker

BA(Hons), Dip Ed, Dip Comp, Dip Theol, Dip Ed Admin (immediate past President)

Barrie was a PMS student 1954-1958, and after graduating at UWA, like many PMS students from the scholarship era, he followed a teaching vocation starting in 1964 at Mount Lawley Senior High School. Barrie spent his whole working career in the field of education, the last 33 years of which were in Technical Education. He was a pioneer in computer education in Western Australia, both in TAFE and for three years at the WA Treasury in charge of State Government computer training. He held positions in TAFE ranging from lecturer to Assistant Director. Whilst there he was seconded part time to the Public Service Commission Doig Management Centre to set up computer training there. He was also in charge of the development of the East Perth TAFE campus.



Barrie has an interest in urban heritage and won the 2011 WA Heritage Council Award for the individual making the greatest contribution to heritage in Western Australia. He is patron of the Mount Lawley Society and a volunteer music teacher at his local primary school. Barrie has other extensive community involvements including the Australian Student Christian Movement and is a Lay Pastoral Minister in the Anglican Church. Sallie was a student at Perth Modern School from 1951-1955. A Home Science Teacher in the country before transferring to Perth Modern School in 1961, Sallie married in 1962 and moved back to the country where she was involved in various community activities. Back in Perth in 1972 Sallie became involved in P&C Associations and with Stirling Players and the development of Stirling Theatre.



In 1978 she was appointed Coordinator of the 150th Celebrations for the City of Stirling and was subsequently invited by the Stirling Council to establish a community support service. In 1990, Sallie was awarded the Rotary Club of Osborne Park City of Stirling Merit Award for Community and Vocational Service. She was elected Chairperson of the Volunteer Centre of Western Australia, and subsequently became its Executive Director, retiring as Executive Director of Volunteering Western Australia in 2001. A founding Director on the Board of Volunteering Australia Sallie served on national committees from 1990. Sallie was awarded a Centenary Medal for her services to the community through Volunteering Western Australia.

He has board experience with private companies, and as a Fellow of both the Australian Institute of Company Directors and the Australian Institute of Management, he has a strong background in Corporate Governance best practice. He has had community involvement with appointments on the Council and Treasurer of St Catherine's College (UWA), Convocation (University of Western Australia),



Parents and Citizens Committees, the Royal Freshwater Bay Yacht Club Offshore Committee, St John of God Subiaco Hospital Consumer Advisory Group and Policy Sub-Committee.

Peter has made a large commitment to the Perth Modernian Society (Inc) having been a Councillor for over ten years and he has served as its Vice President or President since 2006. Irene attended Perth Modern School 1955-59. After University graduation she became a mathematics teacher and a teacher educator, then went on to complete a doctorate in criminology.

She was a member of the team of teachers who revised the teaching of maths in WA schools in the 1960s, and then as a foundation staff member of Edith Cowan University taught and researched in the disciplines of education, psychology, justice studies and criminology. She was part of the team that developed the first degree courses for police and prison officers in WA, and worked to win the collocation of the Police Academy and ECU in Joondalup. Together with selected police officers she was instrumental in the establishment of the *Centre for Police Research*, now



known as the *Sellenger Centre*, which subsequently won ECU's first collaborative ARC grant. In 2004, Irene was appointed Foundation Director - Corruption Prevention, Education and Research in the Corruption and Crime Commission, a role she filled for over six years, leading a team of professionals committed to preventing misconduct in the WA Public Sector.

Upon retirement she accepted community positions as Vice President of the Arthritis Foundation of WA, Chair of the Council of Advice to Arthritis Australia, and member of the Newborough Primary School Board. Irene joined the Council of the Perth Modernian Society in 2013 and was elected as its nominee on the PMS Board in 2015. She has been active in several of the Society's projects and her overriding ambition for the Society is that it is relevant to all Modernians and supports them in the modern world.

He graduated with Honours in 1965, and left WA to pursue a career in electronics. He spent 4 years at AWA involved in electronic design before joining IBM in 1969. Ed's IBM career spanned 27 years and his roles in the Systems Engineering area included installing software systems in many industries in Australia and Asia. He spent 2 years in an IBM research and Development Centre in Florida, responsible for teaching new software to IBM and customer


Barbara Mallett

BA, Dip Ed, M App Ling

Barbara attended PMS in the Music School era and graduated in 1970, as a recipient of a Commonwealth University Scholarship. After completing a BA at UWA, she commenced her first graduate position in 1973 as the Statistical Research Officer of West Australian Newspapers.

Claremont Teachers College (now ECU) pioneered the Dip Ed (Primary) in the late 1970s and Barbara was one of the first graduates. Barbara taught for a brief period as well as spending some time in the business world of Telstra, before "retiring" to life as a mother and hobby farmer when the family moved to the Perth hills a few years later.

During this time Barbara was very active in the P&C at Parkerville PS, which led to her accepting the position of State Councillor for the WA Council of State



Barbara completed a Master of Applied Linguistics through Monash University and has pursued her interest in the development of language from infancy and also the structure of related and unrelated languages. She is a member of the Hills Choir where she assists with pronunciation and intonation when the choir sings in languages other than English. She loves to travel and to explore the lands of her heritage.

In 2010, after assisting in organizing a 40th reunion for her graduating year, Barbara was invited to join the Perth Modernian Society as a Councillor. She led a group on the School Centennial planning day, and since 2015, her commitments have allowed her to take a slightly more active role in the Society and the continuing life of PMS.

Annemarie (Annemie) McAuliffe (née Davies) BA, Dip Ed, MLIS (Vice President)

Annemie attended Perth Modern School 1955-59.

Annemie has followed professional careers in academia, government, the private sector, and board appointments. After completing a BA in Classics at UWA she joined the National Library in Canberra as a library trainee. Her library career saw her working in the ACT and Northern Territory before returning to Perth and working primarily in academic libraries at a time when

returning to Perth and working primarily in academic libraries at a time when libraries were transitioning to computerised operations. Her career expanded into academic teaching, senior library management, business studies and academic politics. She was the first female President of the Academic Staff Association at Curtin University and an elected member of the Curtin Council, later a Ministerial Representative to Council.

In the 1980s Annemie took up an information technology policy position in the Western Australian Government and was posted overseas to London and later to Indonesia. During this time also she was appointed to various State and national boards including Marjory Smart Fellow to St Hilda's College, University of Melbourne, and the Commissioner of the Future.

After leaving Government in the mid-1990s and moving to Kalgoorlie, Annemie established a regional consultancy and undertook significant studies particularly in regional telecommunications, Indigenous business development and land use management. MILESTONES FOR PERTH MODERN SCHOOL EX-STAFF/STUDENT INVOLVEMENT

1913 Annual Reunion held August 1913. Reg Williams (PMS student 1911-13) became joint Hon Secretary for the Perth Modern School Ex-Students Association.

1914 The Perth Modern School Ex-Students Association Incorporated held Ex-Students Day. All members joining in the first year to be known as Foundation Members, with badges available.

Aims of the Association

- To establish a strong esprit de corps amongst the ex-students of the PMS ("Union is strength")
- To further the interests of the School
- To establish a friendly intercourse between the past and present students of the PMS by means of meetings and social functions.
- 1918 Constitution was reviewed and Old Modernians Association Incorporated came into being.
- **1922 Unveiling of War Memorial -** funds were raised by former students and to be managed by the **Old Modernians Trust Fund** appointed in perpetuity.
- **1926-58** *The Sphinx* reported on activities of the **Old Modernians Association** for each calendar year's social events and Ex-Students Days.
- **1960 Keith Graham,** PMS student 1928-29, became the inaugural president of the **Parents and Citizens Association** at Perth Modern School.
- Deed of Trust established under patronage of the **Hon Mr Justice Wolff**, PMS student 1913-14, to establish a legally constituted **Board of Trustees to administer the Library in perpetuity. Old Modernians** asked to contribute.
- 1970 A new library was built as part of the Commonwealth Secondary Schools Library Programme.
- 1970 Joseph Parsons Memorial Library officially opened by Governor General Sir Paul Hasluck, student 1918-22.
- 1973 Launch of a Foundation Committee in December to prepare a proposal for recording, preservation and display of information and objects associated with Perth Modern School. Principal Mr Joe Stokes originated the proposal for the historical record and sought the help of ex-students for the physical and financial requirements of the task.
- 1974-94 Perth Modern School Historical Society established its Museum Collections.
- 1995 Perth Modernian Society Planning Committee formed to establish Perth Modernian Society:
 - Perth Modernian Society (Inc), Registered No. 1004735, 11th July 1995
 - Sphinx Foundation (Inc), established to secure funds and future publication of a School history
 - Historical and Museum Society became a standing Committee of the Society.
- 2005 Launch of **Perth Modern School: the History and the Heritage** researched and published by the Sphinx Foundation. 5,000 copies printed.
- 2008 Sphinx Foundation Constitution revised to empower establishment of the Sphinx Scholarship Fund.
- 2009 Accommodation available for establishment of Perth Modernian Society History Centre.
- The Society entered the electronic age by launching a **portal** and **databases** for (i) ex-Student/staff records and (ii) artefacts.
- 2010 Official launch of the Sphinx Scholarship Fund at the home of Malcolm and Tonya McCusker.
- 2011 Perth Modern School Centenary Year celebrations.
- 2013 Revision of Perth Modernian Society Constitution to accommodate new organisational structure completed
- **Celebrating 40**th anniversary of the establishment of the **PMS Museum Collections** and **100 Years of** *The Sphinx* at Perth Modern School.

Launch of Perth Modernian Society inaugural Strategic Plan 2014-2017.

Confirmation of three inaugural **Modernian Fellows - Sallie Davies**, **Malcolm McCusker and Donald Tyler -** for their outstanding contributions to the Society and PMS.

2015 Celebrated establishment of Perth Modern School's first orchestra 100 years ago.

Council self-assessment survey - completed by all Councillors; collated and analysed by Bruce McCallum.

Revision of Perth Modernian Society Constitution completed in preparation for DGR application for a proposed Museum Fund.

2016 Modernian Awards made to Barrie Baker, Deborah Beresford, Ian Jarvis, Alan Porter and Alison Woodman for their outstanding contributions to the Society and PMS.
