President's Report 2018

Overview of 2017

- The Society had a fantastic year in what was accomplished despite the dark cloud from Feb. to June caused by the controversial policy by the Labor Opposition, which became the McGowan Government, to repurpose Perth Mod.
- The respect earned from all the other components of the Perth Mod community - along with the general public, and even the WA Govt. and the Opposition parties, was most gratifying.
- Many of the present crop of parents played a huge part in the successful Save Perth Mod campaign and in the process a high level of mutual respect blossomed, so it's an opportune time to try and build on that.
- Lots of Save Perth Mod campaign visual materials used so effectively in the public rally have found a permanent home in the History Centre.
- The Society's Balance Sheet is at a high during the era that I've been on the Council.









Initiatives in 2017

• Branding: Society banners and the ladies' Sphinx-motif scarf - launched at the September Annual Reunion and available for purchase along with other memorabilia at this meeting and via our website.



- Several Councillors contributed the funds to create the annual Perth Modernian Society English Literature prize for a year 12 student.
- The History Centre and School were on show during the Heritage Perth weekend in October – this being a first for Perth Mod.
- Sales of the Entertainment Book to raise funds for the H&M Committee.

Initiatives in 2017

- Revision of the Constitutions for the Perth Modernian Society Inc and the Sphinx Foundation Inc.
- Drafting a Constitution for a separate subsidiary the Perth Modernian Society Museum Association Incorporated. Tax exempt status, registered as a Charity with the ACNC.
- Sales of the Entertainment Book to raise funds for the H&M Committee.
- Preliminary work for updating the Society's Strategic Plan in 2018.
- The Society will contribute towards a futuristic new Sphinx sculpture that will face Roberts Road Subiaco, It will symbolise Perth Mod going forward and ever upward.
- There are vacancies on the Council and it will be good news if these can be filled later in the AGM.


Perth Modernian Society Annual Oration






Membership Trends

Historic and Museum (H&M) Committee

Perth Modernian Society Finances

Income and Expenditure 2017 FY:

Income amounted to \$23,352 and Expenses \$15,952 giving a net Operating Surplus of \$7,400.

The Society had net cash at bank at 31/12/2017 of \$27,301 (cf 2016 \$19,600), and Net Assets = \$28,265 (cf 2016 \$20,373).



SPHINX FOUNDATION INC.

Governance:

- In 2017 the **Board of Directors** comprised: Barrie Baker (Chairman), Peter Farr (Hon. Treasurer), Eve Broadley, Jeanette McQueen (Secy.), Nigel Hunt (parent), William Philogene (parent). Val Furphy (Associate Principal) (ex-officio) represented the School Principal.
- The amended constitution of the Sphinx Foundation (Inc) was completed in September and endorsed at a Special General meeting of the Perth Modernian Society, held on 10 September 2017.

Sphinx Foundation Inc. and Sphinx Scholarship Fund Finances

- The Sphinx Foundation Net Cash at bank at 31 Dec. 2017 was \$913.
- Scholarship Fund Asset summary as at 31 Dec 2017:

- The net return on average investment assets for the year 2017 was **7.0%** (2016 = 6.4%).
- The Management Expense Ratio (MER) in year 2017 was a low 0.7%.





The Society thanks the **93** donors to the Sphinx Scholarship Fund in 2017 – this was a record number in one year and included 36 first-time donors, most probably reflecting the society's high profile and effectiveness during the Save PMS campaign in 2017.

Donors contributed **\$115,450** during 2017.

- Over 400 people have donated to the Scholarship Fund since its inception.
- Around \$900,000 is invested and earning interest.

Sphinx Scholarship Awards Summary

The Sphinx Scholarship Fund had a record-breaking year in 2017 in terms of the number and value of scholarships and bursaries awarded to PMS students, and in Feb. 2018 provided a valuable helping hand to 68 needy and worthy students in a wide range of categories.

New financial awards able to be created in 2017 comprised:

- The Jim Leslie Scholarship is aimed at facilitating the achievement of educational success by removing barriers and providing access to opportunities to students in Years 11 and 12 at PMS.
- The Raymond Dingle and Gai Harris

4-year Scholarship – [Funds donated by Modernian Dr Raymond Dingle (1948-1952) and his partner Gai Harris]

- The Regina Vida Dingle Family Equity
 Scholarship (2018 only) [Funds for the
 Scholarship were donated by the children
 of Dr Raymond Dingle and Regina Vida Dingle]
- **16 additional academic excellence bursaries** for students entering Year 11 in 2018.

Sphinx Foundation Comparisons

The only two W.A. public schools with comparable foundations which offer significant scholarships are:

- The Kentian Scholarship Foundation established in 2009 by the Kent Street High School Kentian Society. 7 scholarships awarded in 2017 – total value \$6,754 (average value ~\$1,000).
- The Churchlands Senior High School Foundation (Inc.) incorporated in 2014 to support and enrich the school and its students *4 Music scholarships in 2017*.

Public Thank You from the Perth Modernian Society

The Perth Modernian Society Inc, representing the alumni and former teachers of Perth Modern School, welcomes the announcement on 13 June 2017 by the Premier Hon Mark McGowan and Ministers Hon Sue Ellery and Hon Rita Saffioli that Perth Modern School Is to remain on its existing heritage site in Sublaco as Western Australia's only fully selective academic government school.

We are grateful that the McGowan Government has decided not to change Perth Mod's role and that this decision has been managed in a respectful and timely manner. It is very rare for any government to reconsider an election policy and the McGowan Government's decision to change the Education Central policy after a preparedness to listen to the community's concerns, is gratefully recognised and we thank them. This school has an international reputation for excellence and this decision is resonating very widely.

Perth Mod opened to students in 1911 and was to pioneer a modern education where the sciences and modern languages were to be on an equal footing with classical education. In 1912, the school introduced enfrance examinations in response to the high demand for places. In 1959 Perth Mod lost its selective entry status and this was not restored until 2007. In 2017 Perth Mod's supporters stood up to be counted, and were heard. We recognise and thank YOU for all your magnificent efforts.

The parents of the existing 1300+ Perth Mod students were concerned about maintaining continuity of quality education for their children. Alumni and others involved in preserving Perth Mod were concerned about its heritage and outstanding record for producing students who excelled in many fields of endeavour of national and international significance. But more broadly there was a groundswell of people who warted to support the history and heritage of the first Government co-educational senior secondary school in Western Australia.

'Save Perth Mod' became a very public cause, and the Society extends its profound thanks to everyone who supported Mod In its hour of need. They wrote a never-ending stream of Letters to the Editor, and they very willingly signed our petitions - In fact over 10,000 persons did so from Port Hediand in the north to Albany in the south. This reinforces our view that Perth Modern School has earned the unique position of being held in the highest regard across Australia as a school which is merit based and provides students regardless of their family background or personal circumstances with the highest quality public school education to allow them to achieve their potential.

14,000 Modernians across Australia and around the world commend the McGowan Government for having listened to concerns about the 'Education Central' proposal and taken the widespread community feedback into account in developing a revised direction that leaves intact the wonderful institution that is so well recognised that it is fondly called 'Perth Mod' or just 'Mod'.

The Perth Modernian Society also thanks the many Members of Parliament from all sides, and City of Sublaco Councillors, who listened to the students, ther parents, the PAC Association, the Perth Modern School Board, and Modernians and the general public. We are elemaity grateful to the journalists and editors of the print and electronic media who saw it as their professional responsibility to shine a light on the buses about which the Perth Mod stakeholders were so concerned.

The McGowan Government's welcome announcement to save Perth Mod was not only an important victory for democracy, but importantly, allows Perth Mod to continue its tradition of exemplary education for high-achieving students, who come from all corners of this State to be educated in a Government school which is open to all students regardless of circumstances. It also means that the valuable support services that the Perth Modernian Society and the Sphinx Scholarship Fund provide to Perth Mod will continue stronger than ever, for the benefit of our state, our nation and the global community.

The Society records it's thanks to the public and the Stale Government most sincerely. We look forward to supporting the Government In the pursuit of quality public education in WA.

May I encourage and welcome all former students and staff who are not already registered to join the Perth Modernian Society.
