MUSEUM MATTERS

This e-Newsletter marks 10 years since the History Centre was made available as a future workspace for museum volunteers to create student and visitor opportunities to honour the history and share the heritage of Perth Modern School with the wider community.

Volunteers

Volunteers continue to make the PMS Museum a fun place of activity on Monday mornings, while Deb Beresford and Deirdre Owen make sure that the Archive Room is busy on Tuesdays.





This term, we have been joined by newly retired volunteer, Peter Dillon. Peter brings to our band, skills in photography and an expertise across the science world and Alan Porter has been happy to share responsibility with Peter for the Science Collection.

IT Support

As reported in the September e-Newsletter, we have been successful in achieving several grants in 2019. The combined outcome of the Department of Social Services Volunteer Grant (\$3,750) and the Lotterywest Grant (\$8,250) has been an upgrading of software across our IT system as well as some new laptops. While the upgrade has created some instability at times in our network in the short-term, lan Jarvis has worked assiduously to manage the updating. Our most recent Board member, Jeffrey Lai, convened an IT Working Party meeting that included lan, representatives from the Society, the School, and P&C. As an outcome, Ian would like to embed understanding of the capacity of the data-base to more IT adept volunteers, who might continue to enter and use data. Support for lan's work was forthcoming from the P&C attendees. At that meeting, we very gratefully received information that under some circumstances, the Department will allow some school community groups to access the Department internet line. While the museum is nowhere near cabling etc to make this happen (so continues to rely on a remote wifi connection), the archive room is very able to take advantage of this possibility. Ian is now working with the school's IT coordinator to further investigate this avenue.

War Memorial facelift

Our third grant in 2019 was received from the Department of Veterans Affairs, Saluting their Service, for \$4,000. This grant was specifically identified to refurbish the School Memorial and seat - to re-point, clean and re-letter. In addition, a granite plinth with the names of the men whose names are not recorded on the original memorial, is to be added. The Museum Association was overwhelmed when an alumnus family made a donation that ensures that the whole project will be completed this year. The refurbishment of the memorial and seat is now complete with the plinth to be added before Christmas.

should be adopted as the appropriate eligibility criteria for inclusion. Statements from the Australian War Memorial and the WA War Memorial (at Kings Park) as well as others, were considered. Both the Committee and Board affirmed as policy that the eligibility statement should read:

On this memorial are recorded the names of those alumni of Perth Modern School who died as a result of their military service to Australia during the Great War 1914-1918 [or, for another memorial, the appropriate military action].

An added footnote used by the Australian War Memorial will also be included:

Australians who died during these periods of conflict but were not serving with Australian armed forces may be included in the Commemorative Roll.

We now look forward to the conclusion of this stage of the project, which PMS Principal Lois Joll has suggested would be appropriate to be unveiled at the PMS ANZAC Ceremony in 2020.

History Centre Activities

Throughout this term, the Museum has received a steady stream of visitors on Monday mornings, as alumni or their families and friends have sought to research or renew school connections. In this term, reunions add to the visitors received. The Class of 1949 visited on the day of the School Reunion and the Class of 1959 arrived in force in October and the Class of 2009 on 22 November. As the year draws to a close, the School has a P&C picnic and Christmas Carol evening after school on 6th December – when the Museum will again open for visitors together with heritage tours of the school conducted by recently graduated PMS student volunteers who have agreed to return to participate.

John attended the University of Western Australia and obtained a Diploma of Journalism. He was a member of the staff of *The West Australian* before travelling to England in 1937 to further his journalistic career. While in London he obtained a temporary position on the staff of *The Times*, where his varied experiences included covering the Coronation of King George VI on 12th May 1937. In a mock battle conducted by Bomber Command before war broke out, the job of going up in one of the "invading" aircraft was offered to "the mad Australian", as John was known. He jumped at it.

From *The Times* John went to Allied Press, and after that he was associate editor on *Cavalcade*, a news magazine. Before war broke out in September 1939, John was chosen from 600 applicants for a position on the Public Relations Press Section of the Air Ministry and over the ensuing three years rose to the position of Officer-in-Charge. In 1942 John enlisted in the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. According to his

father, "John chose the Air Sea Rescue Service because that meant the saving of life instead of the taking of it "

John was posted to 961 Squadron, RAF, based at Dover. The squadron operated barrage balloons and Air Sea Rescue launches. He was given command of High Speed Launch (HSL) 122 with the rank of Pilot Officer and was later promoted to Acting Flying-Officer. He was delighted when the first pilot he rescued was an Australian.

John lost his life during *Operation Jubilee*, a poorly planned and ill-fated allied assault on the German-occupied port of Dieppe in France on 19 August 1942. The operation involved 6,000 Allied soldiers, primarily Canadian, supported by 237 navy vessels and 74 squadrons of fighters and bombers. The operation achieved none of its objectives and losses were heavy.

John was in command of HSL 122 which performed the dangerous work of picking up survivors from ships and aircraft. HSL 122 was attacked and set on fire by a Heinkel bomber and several Luftwaffe fighters in midafternoon. HSL 123 came to the rescue of HSL 122 but was also attacked and set on fire. Both launches were abandoned at approximately 5:20pm. The fighters continued attacking with cannon and machine gun fire while the survivors were in the water. John and four of his crew of 11 were killed in the attacks and another four were wounded, one of whom died the next day. Two survivors were captured and became prisoners of war.

The survivors of both launches were later rescued by HSL 177 while two RAF Spitfires provided overhead protection. John's body was never recovered. He was the only child of Charles and Lucia Hill, husband to Peggy and father to a young son, David. He was 30 when he died John is remembered on panel 67 in the Air Forces Memorial at Runnymede, west of London, along with over 20,000 other Commonwealth air force personnel who have no known grave.

John did not die in vain; the hard-learned lessons from the Dieppe Raid in 1942 contributed substantially to the success of the Allied invasion of Europe in June 1944 and saved many lives. LEST WE FORGET

We were grateful to **Lois Joll** for sacrificing her Sunday to lead an enthusiastic group of **59ers** on a tour of recent and exciting campus developments. They saw so much without challenging their 77-year old legs. Others were directed to the Museum/History Centre where dedicated History Centre volunteers had set up a display targeted at our years at Mod. While looking at *Bunsen Burners*, *Domi-Sci notebooks* and old *sports pockets*, visitors were amazed to hear about the archives and history records available. I, for one, was astonished that in just a few hours Sallie could connect me to a long since dead cousin who attended Mod in the early thirties. Several **59ers** plan to donate to the cause and fund a chair to honour friends. **Peter Farr**, immediate past President of the Modernian Council, addressed the group with stories about the recent, successful *Save Perth Modern School' Campaign*. He threw light on the outstanding work of the Perth Modernian Society and the Museum/History Centre. At least a few of those listening resolved to update their details with the Society, both for the archives and so they can be kept in touch with events.



But this was not to be a formal function. Soon speeches gave way to eating, drinking (thanks to **Merv Lynch** and **Mal Evans**), sharing and laughter. After leaving PMS, and graduating with a Bachelor of Education at UWA, Peter taught for two years in the South West of WA, but realized during this time that he really wanted to pursue his musical studies further. In 1968 he set out for Florence, Italy, where he engaged in Electronic and Computer music at the Villa Schifanoia Graduate School of Arts, along the way learning to speak Italian fluently. He gained his Master's degree in 1971. Thus equipped with the skills to work as a researcher, teaching assistant, and programmer of computer music, he took up a position in the School of Music at the University of Illinois, USA. After some time in this job, he started studies that culminated in his Doctor of Musical Arts in Composition with a minor in Computer Science (1989). A friend of his described Peter's talents thus: "When we met he was working on a project to design and build a computer synthesizer to create and perform electronic music. Not only did something like this require the skills of a musician, but also those of a computer scientist and an electrical engineer."

While he was expanding his interest in computer music, he enjoyed playing mostly piano, but also the trombone, in jazz bands around Chicago. He was popular, and could improvise brilliantly.

Peter was a very accomplished pianist, playing in a variety of gigs. From 1977 he also worked as a ballet accompanist for the University Department of Dance, and for other major studios, including the Hyde Park School of Ballet, Chicago (for 26 years). This was the happiest, most settled period of his life; in 1999 he married Anya, co-pianist at the school, and they proved to be successful partners at work and at play (!), beloved by the whole company

Sadly, Peter struggled with multiple health problems over the last few years, and died on May 13th, 2019. The people at the Hyde Park Ballet studio showed their tremendous love and respect for him by organizing a memorial service - a gesture that his sister, Anne (UK), and wife, Anya found to be absolutely heart-warming.

I did too, and thought it was worth acknowledging his life and achievements in this newsletter, for those school friends who remember him. I had caught up with Anne, and subsequently Peter in 2017, when searching for 'lost' UWA graduates. Elyse Bourgault - nee Sagar .
