2021 AUSTRALIA DAY HONOURS

Dr KENNETH FITCH AO PMS student 1945-1949

In the 2021 Australia Day Honours Ken received the **Order of Australia for distinguished service to sports medicine at the national and international level through a range of roles and to medical education.** He was **Perth Modern School Captain** in **1949** and tied for the Ambrose Cummins Cup as best all-round athlete in that year.

In 1979 Ken was granted AM (Member of the Order of Australia) in recognition of service to sports, received the Australian Sports Medal in 2000 for his involvement and significant contribution to sport and sports medicine at state and national level for many sports and recognised with a Centenary Medal on 1 January 2001 for service to sport and sports medicine.



Dr ROY SCRAGG AM OBE PMS student 1937-38

Roy attended PMS in **2nd** and **3rd** year before the family left for Tasmania. Now living in South Australia, in the 2021 Australia Day Honours he was made a Member of the Order of Australia **for services to medicine, epidemiology and to medical associations.**

Dr Scragg was the founding editor of the PNG Medical Journal in 1955, Foundation Professor of Social & Preventative Medicine University of Papua New Guinea from 1970 to 1974 and Founding Director of SA Postgraduate Medical Education Association from 1974 to 1982.

He has served on ANZAAS, the Royal Australian College of Medical Administrators, Australasian Epidemiology Association, the Public Health Association of Australia, the ANZ Society of History of Medicine and has been a member of Rotary in PNG and in Adelaide as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Dr Scragg was appointed Officer of the Order of the British Empire **OBE** for **Public Services in Papua New Guinea.**

Dr Roy Scragg, MBBS, Master of Public Health, MD recently advised our readers through this newsletter, of his admission to the degree of **Doctor of the University of Adelaide (honoris causa).**

Dear Modernians

Perth Modern School students this year have achieved the highest ever median ATAR recorded in WA, with all students in the cohort (243) achieving a median ATAR of 97.55 compared to the State median of 81.65. The Class of 2020 also achieved two more State records, with 21 General Exhibitions achieved and 72 students attaining an ATAR of 99+. In addition, six Subject Exhibitions were awarded to five students.

Five students recorded a perfect ATAR score of 99.95 - **Jake Cho, Akash Jayaram, Ryan Joseph Anson, Leosha Trushin and Savindi Wimalaratne.**

Our Head Boy, **Dylan Crowe** and Head Girl, **Julia Aguinot**, both achieved 99+ ATARs and Dylan also received a General Exhibition, which was a wonderful result considering the responsibility they held throughout the year as part of their leadership roles.

Many of our top performing students were also involved in a variety of co-curricular activities throughout the year including community service, school musicals, bands and ensembles, debating and other undertakings.

I am delighted with these results - achieving a median ATAR of 97.55 is a tremendous group effort by the Class of 2020. Together with our dedicated staff and supported by parents, our students inspire and support each other to be their best which is a winning combination.

in Years 11 and 12. New awards this year are: **The Hunt Family Politics & Law Scholarship**, three **Dr Phil E. Best Science Bursaries**, and three **Malka Equity Scholarships** (Senior School). **32** Scholarships for students in Years 8, 9, 10 were also renewed at a value of \$39,000, and **14** Scholarships and Bursaries have been awarded to incoming Year 7 students at a value of \$15,000 this year and \$52,000 over the life of the respective awards. \$2,000 was provided for Principal's Discretionary Bursaries.

All up then, in February the Sphinx Scholarship Fund distributed \$94,000 to some 90 students – a record monetary amount made possible by generous Modernians and philanthropists. The latter since 2020 includes the **Malka Foundation** which in 2021 is also underwriting 20 upper school students to do the intensive **Mannkal Leadership and Entrepreneurship** program.

Accountability: Note that all scholarship funds are lodged with the PMS Finance Office to ensure that the funds are spent for permitted purposes only. Also, upper school awardees are required to make a report at the end of their Year 12 on how they have used and benefitted from the funds they received.

RALPH BROCKMAN

PMS student 1951-55, School Captain 1955

Tribute by classmate **Ross Kelly:**

I first met Brocky in 1950, at the age of 12, on a Friday afternoon at Woodville Reserve – a park just down the road from my old school; the North Perth Primary School. North Perth was playing an Aussie Rules footy game against Inglewood Primary and I was playing in the centre. Ralph was captaining Inglewood and I played on him I can't remember who won the game, but I can still see Ralph's number – it was number 1. I spent most of the game looking at it, chasing it while he proceeded to deliver a "best on the ground" performance.

Six months passed before I spoke to Ralph again, this time at cricket practice conducted by our Maths teacher and Sports Master **Eric Strauss**, during our first week at Modern School.

That day, and in the years that followed, Ralph demonstrated that he was an even better cricketer than footballer – initially playing cricket for the Modern School under-16s (in those days the University Cricket Club's underage team); then rapidly progressing through the ranks to the point where, in his final year at School, he played several A Grade games alongside Eric, who played A Grade cricket for the University Cricket Club, although Ralph's teacher was then his mentor. Later Eric became one of his lifelong friends.

After leaving School Ralph elected to study pharmacy at Perth Technical College. Because he didn't attend UWA, he couldn't continue to play cricket with the University Club. Accordingly he transferred to the Mt Lawley Cricket Club where he continued to have a fruitful cricket career.

It goes without saying that Ralph was a power in School cricket – playing in the First Eleven for the final three years of the five years he was at school and captaining the team in its final year.

In 1952 he was also selected in the State Schoolboy's Team that represented Western Australia in a carnival played on the Sydney Cricket Ground. Four of his classmates also made the side – Len Thomas, Harry Kuhaupt, Les Smith and me. What a trip it was! First time out of the state, first time on an aeroplane, first time in a city anywhere near as big as Sydney, walking across that massive bridge we barely knew existed, travelling up to Newcastle on the longest train we'd ever seen, playing on the iconic Sydney Cricket Ground, shaking hands with Australia's newest test cricketer, Richie Benaud, and chatting with Richie's employer, the legendary Stan McCabe, at Stan's sports equipment shop in the centre of Sydney. I still get quite excited when I think about that trip and I'm pretty sure that Ralph did too.

And, of course, in the winter there was football. Brocky was a member of the first XVIII in his final two years at school, during which time the team went undefeated. Out of school he played with distinction in the East Perth underage competition.

Lest I give the impression that his achievements were confined to sport, I assure you that nothing could be further from the truth. Then, like now, Modern School was a selective School and Ralph also excelled in class, consistently finishing among the top 10% of the students in his year.

In his final year he was made **School Captain**, pictured here with fellow 1955 Prefects seated in centre front row next to Headmaster Noel Sampson.

For a while after leaving School, we continued to play football together at Maylands

Inglewood but gradually our paths diverged. We studied different courses at different institutions, played cricket at different clubs and played football in different competitions.

However in those days Perth was a pretty small place and we were able to keep track of each other and continue to meet intermittently.

Then I went to live and work overseas. We didn't see each other much for a number of years. On my return to Australia we reconnected through the Lake Karrinyup Golf Club where we were both members. We had many, many happy times there together.

How do I sum up the boy I went to school with all those years ago? Obviously he was an outstanding sportsman and an exceptional student. He was also down to earth and despite having many reasons not to be so, was unaffected, even humble. He was universally liked. Above all he was a leader, and continued to be so for the rest of his life.

Dr PATRICIA KOTAI-EWERS OAM MA Phil PhD
PMS student 1952-56

Patricia (Trisha) Ewers, born July 17th 1939, was the only child of Jean (née McIntyre) and John Keith Ewers, both Modernians and both teachers. Keith was also an author. Trisha attended Cottesloe State School (1945-51) and Perth Modern School (1952-56). At Mod she became a prefect, played hockey for the school, and edited the Sphinx magazine. She went to UWA and Teachers College, and was appointed to Collie Senior High School to teach French.

Trisha married Peter Kotai, and they had three daughters – Haede, Kate and Clara. Peter and Trisha moved to Trisha's childhood home in Peppermint Grove: they built a new home for her parents at the rear of the large block, and extended and modified the original house. Trisha taught French at several metropolitan schools, both state and private. Her marriage to Peter didn't last, but they remained friends.



Trisha continued her studies, gaining a M.A. Phil. Her Ph.D. was based on the history of the Fellowship of Writers (WA), a history she had lived: both Trisha and her father were long-term presidents of FAW(WA). When her mother's mental health declined, Trisha became interested in dementia. She recorded sufferers' conversations and turned their comments into free verse, producing a book, Listen to the Talk of Us. In 2015 Trisha was honoured with a Medal of the Order of Australia for services to literature, and Alzheimer's research.

Trisha died on January 17th 2021 after many months of indifferent health.

Trisha included her family of 3 daughters and 4 granddaughters in her Lifetime Achievements:

- Soloist with WA Ballet company - understudying Terri Charlesworth in Giselle.
- Secretary Craft Association,
- Singing with the Perth Oratorio Choir for 20 years.
- President of Fellowship of Australian Writers WA for 15 + years.

Her contribution to the 2005 publication Perth Modern School: the History and the Heritage provided readers with an understanding and historical record of the achievements of other writers who were also students at PMS.

BERYL HUME

PMS student 1945-49, Teacher 1957-58

Beryl was Senior Girl at Mod in her final year, and was awarded a Maths A, Maths B and Applied Maths Exhibition on her Leaving Exam results. Beryl's brother Brian Hume followed her in winning a scholarship to PMS (1947-51). She went on to complete BSc with Honours, and DipEd at the University of WA, studied at Claremont Teachers College and achieve MA (Maths) at Washington University in Seattle, USA.

After teaching briefly at John Curtin High School and tutoring at UWA, she returned to Mod to teach Maths in 1957-58 was then appointed Maths Lecturer, then Senior Lecturer at UWA 1959-87.

Along with several other PMS mathematicians (Malcolm Hood, Gene Matthews and Barrie Baker), Beryl was a foundation donor in 2015 to create the Perth Modernian Society Mathematics Scholarship and Bursary, which are open to students completing Year 10 at Mod. In this way Beryl's legacy continues to shine at PMS. Readers are invited to share further tributes to Beryl in the next issue of this Newsletter.

JOY REGAN (nee Whiteman)

PMS Student 1941-42

A granddaughter's tribute

BRIAN KLOPPER

PMS student 1953-54

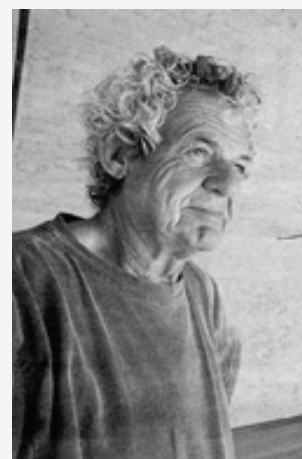
This tribute below was written by Peter Hobbs, WA Chapter President, Australian Institute of Architects

Brian Klopper was one of WA's great architects of the latter 20th century. He pioneered the re-use of buildings, such as warehouses and factories, into inner city living apartments in Fremantle and Perth, all before the phrase "adaptive re-use" was coined. He invented two material standards: the now ubiquitous steel window, and cut limestone cavity blockwork, both of which are now industry standards.

He led the way with re-cycled materials before sustainably and embodied energy were even thought about.

He mentored a generation of architects with his generous spirit of sharing and teaching.

Brian created an enviable body of work, underpinned with rigorous modernist planning clothed with an Arts and Crafts sensibility.



From modest means in Northam, he was educated at Perth Mod and then at Perth Tech. He had a fierce intellect, always questioning and challenging, a love of ideas accompanied with an extraordinary appetite for life. On behalf of the entire architecture community, we send our love to his architect sons Matt and Sam, and to the rest of his family.

Footnote: Brian Klopper's work was the subject of an exhibition at the University of Western Australia in 2012. An outspoken architect/ builder, Klopper developed a cult following for his idiosyncratic houses of rustic inventiveness in urban settings. An architect/builder/developer, his work, firstly in Subiaco and later in Fremantle, is largely single and multi-residential. This is what the late Marcus Collin wrote about Brian in 2012:

"Klopper attained something approaching cult status in the 1980s, with real estate agents advertising certain properties as "Klopperesque." His persona closely matches his work, and the words rugged, forthright, outspoken, bush philosopher, bush lawyer, bush businessman and imposing (six and a half feet) come to mind when thinking of him, as well as articulate, intelligent and well-read. His reaction to the predominant professional style of black clothes (dark grey if you are an individual) and architectural jargon such as 'paradigm', 'learning vessels', 'infinity plans' etc. is simple - 'bullshit'."

DIGITAL HONOUR BOARD

Volunteers in the PMS Museum History Centre have been working on a digital honour board to commemorate the 151 former students who died as a result of their service in World War 1 (29), World War 2 (118), Malaya (1) and Vietnam (3). It has been posted on the school's website and is the result of the accumulation researched information by a considerable number of people since 1915. The project was funded partly by donations to the Perth Modernian Society Museum Association and partly by a grant from the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

The honour board can be sorted by column which provides some poignant information. For example, sorting by Date of Death and then Unit shows that both Leslie Little and Frank Williamson commenced at Modern School when it opened in 1911, served in France in the 51st Battalion, and died within three weeks of each other in 1916. Leslie was 19 years and 11 months old and Frank was 17 years and 10 months, the youngest of the school's students to die as a result of their service. Clicking on their names shows that they both died in the fighting at Mouquet Farm in France. Our continuing research will gradually fill the remaining empty cells and there is a feedback form for readers to let us know of any errors.

The next stage of the digital honour board project is to link each name to a short biography similar to the profiles that have been appearing in the newsletters over the last two years. The stage will be to develop a Nominal Roll to commemorate the 1,592 students who served and survived the experience. The University of Western Australia Historical Society has recently released a similar nominal roll of UWA World War 2 survivors consisting of 1,401 names at <https://www.web.uwa.edu.au/uwahs/uwa-ww2/nominal-roll>

MODERNIANS WHO DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY

PMS student 1934-35

Roy David Maconachie was born in Dundee, Scotland, on 31 May 1920. His father, David, was a grocer and the family home was at 1282 Hay Street, West Perth. He had red hair and was known to his younger sister Rhoda and brothers Norman and Gordon as "Big Ginge".

Roy commenced at Mod on 6 February 1934 in second year. He was a good student and at the end of 1935 passed his Junior examinations in English, French, History, Maths A, Maths B, Physics, Chemistry and Geography.

Roy enlisted in the Army at the Claremont Showgrounds on 6 December 1940 aged 20. Roy's father died in 1940 and he nominated his mother, Flora, of 53 Government Road, Bassendean, as his next-of-kin. He was employed by Goldsbrough, Mort and Company as a clerk at the time of his enlistment.

WX9801 Roy was appointed to the 2/4th Machine Gun Battalion on 9 January 1941 and qualified as a Signaller on 1 May 1941. During that time, he became engaged to Irene Gilby of Shenton Park. On 30 December 1941 the Battalion departed from Darwin for overseas service, arriving in Singapore on 24 January 1942.



By this time the Japanese had pushed the remnants of the British forces down the Malayan Peninsula and onto Singapore Island. The gunners of the 2/4th Machine Gun Battalion fought hard and well defending the Island but suffered heavily. Between 8 and 15 February the 2/4th had 267 casualties including 137 men killed or missing. Two of those were PMS students **Manson Butcher (1936-39)** who was killed on 11 February aged 19, and **Benjamin Hansen (1925-27)** who was killed on 12 February, aged 29.

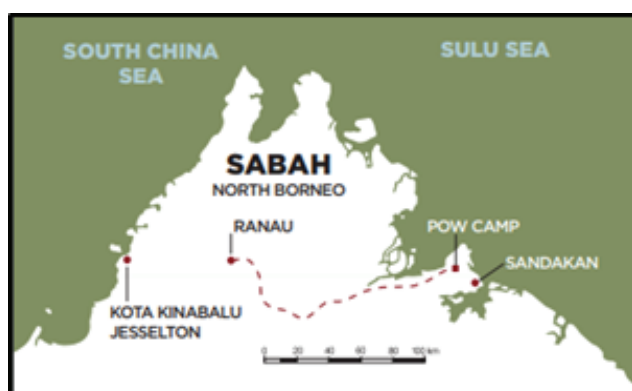
The survivors became prisoners of war (POW) when the British commander, Lt General Percival, surrendered all British forces on 15 February 1942.

POW #1067 Roy Maconachie was interned in Changi gaol until 8 July 1942 when, as a member of "B" Force comprising 1,495 Australians, he was transported to Sandakan in North Borneo (now Sabah) to construct a military airstrip. On arrival 10 days later, they marched 13kms to Sandakan No. 1 POW Camp.

The construction work was hard and conditions were hot. Their clothes and boots disintegrated and their rations were at bare survival level. Tropical illnesses such as malaria, beriberi and tropical ulcers, and an absence of medical supplies, took a severe toll. Regular random thrashings by the "bash gangs" resulted in more deaths. A runway was completed in September 1943. However, frequent Allied bombing put the airstrip out of action by December 1944.

In early 1945, the Japanese High Command ordered that no prisoners were to survive the war. Those still able to walk were sent on three series of death marches through the mountains to the town of Ranau, 260kms from Sandakan. The first series of marches occurred between January and March 1945. They comprised 470 prisoners in 10 groups of around 50 prisoners each. Prisoners who collapsed from exhaustion were killed or left to die on the track.

Roy was in the second series of marches which consisted of 536 prisoners. Roy left the Sandakan camp with the first group on 29 May 1945 and died 42kms from Sandakan on either 3 June (AWM, CWGC and Silver) or 5 June (NAA) from acute enteritis (inflammation of the small intestine). He was one of the 353 who died on the track.

The final march began on 9 June 1945. Only 75 of the remaining 250 prisoners at Sandakan were able to walk. None survived 50kms. When they fell a Japanese guard shot them. The remaining prisoners at Sandakan were either killed or left to die of sickness and starvation.

A handful of prisoners escaped while on the marches or from Ranau. Six of these, all Australians, survived. They are the only survivors of the 2,434 Allied prisoners sent to Sandakan, 1,787 of whom were Australians. The Sandakan death marches remain the greatest single atrocity committed against Australians in war.

Roy was 25 when he died. He is remembered on Panel 18 of the Labuan Memorial.

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
