Mahek won a cash prize and three trophies; one for herself, one for Perth Modern School and one for the Rotary Club of Subiaco which sponsored her. After a gruelling three rounds of competition, on the day of the final which was September 4, Mahek used a series of public speaking techniques to craft and present a six-minute speech on the topic 'Down Syndrome Discrimination' while integrating and analysing the values of the Rotary 4 Way Test. Mahek asked the audience:

"Firstly, is it the truth? Put your hand up if you have a child or a younger sibling. Imagine, they tell you, tears rolling out their eyes, that no one wanted to play with them at lunch time, how would you feel? The pain we share is indescribable, unbearable, but think about those that face it every single day. According to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, over 74 per cent of children with down syndrome experience bullying regularly."

"I am sick of being put in a box. Just because I attend an academically selective school doesn't mean book-smart defines me! Similarly... people with Down Syndrome are not defined by incapable and flawed. Each one has unique talents that we must embrace but also acknowledge that their difficulties are no barrier to success. Motivating examples like Ellie Goldstein; a world class model, Tazia Fawley; an artistic treasure, and Steven Brandon; an accomplished actor, prove this fact. As a society, it is something we must encourage to dispel past prejudices, and inspire others with Down Syndrome to dream big, therefore cultivating goodwill in our community."

Principal of Perth Modern School Mitchell Mackay said he was thrilled for Mahek as she had worked really hard and displayed level of maturity beyond her years in how she approached the topic. "Mahek really threw herself into this competition, seeking advice, striving to be her best and giving it her all," Mr Mackay said. "Perth Modern is very proud of her."

Year 11 and 12 PMS students are involved in Rotary's junior group, Interact, and participate in several community projects during the year.

SHIRLEY RANDELL (nee IZETT) PMS student 1953-57

In a recent email to family and friends Shirley wrote:

I was delighted to visit Kigali in **Rwanda** again, following my participation in the Commonwealth Heads of Government conference in 2022. This time I was a participant and speaker at the Sixth Women Deliver conference, the world's largest conference on gender equality and the health, rights, and wellbeing of girls and women in the 21st century. It was wonderful to meet old friends, like Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka, Chair of Women Deliver and former United Nations Under-Secretary General. 6,000 thousand decision-makers from diverse fields in over 165 countries, including civil society, government, the private sector, and international agencies, alongside women's rights organizations and movements, youth-led and LGBTQIA+ organizations, and advocates representing the intersectional identities of girls, women, and underrepresented populations in low- and middle-income countries met.



The aim was to identify solutions and drive progress for gender equality. In addition, more than 200,000 people joined around the world through satellite events and the virtual program. Rwanda was selected as the venue because the Global Gender Gap Index ranks Rwanda the second most gender equal country in Africa and seventh in the world, with a score of 80.5 percent. The Victorian Government, in partnership with the Commonwealth Government, was the Pacific Regional Convening Partner for Women Deliver 2023 and I was pleased

to attend the regional meeting in Melbourne with 380 delegates before travelling overseas to Rwanda.

The Pacific and Melbourne convening events provided an opportunity for regional gender equality priorities to be identified, and to build momentum towards and prepare to represent those priorities on the global stage in Rwanda. I was one of 65 delegates from the Oceanic Pacific region attending Women Deliver 2023, led by the Minister for Women in Victoria.

My Fortunate Life as a Teacher and Naturalist in Western Australia

Eric McCrum, PMS student 1950-51 and **School Prefect 1951**, has accepted Council's invitation to deliver the 2023 Annual Oration to PMS senior students on 27 November 2023.

Distinguished Modernian **Eric McCrum OAM** grew up in Bassendean, where he spent much of his childhood exploring the wildlife around the Swan River. Eric was educated at Bassendean Primary School, Midland High School, Perth Modern School, and Claremont Teachers College.

Eric's passion for nature has led him to work as a teacher, headmaster, and nature educator, passing on his knowledge of nature to many students over the years. Indeed, for over seventy years. He has devoted himself to understanding the natural world, and spreading his enthusiasm and knowledge to children and adults alike. For ten years Eric taught at the Perth Zoo Education Centre, and then for fourteen years at the Gould League Wildlife Centre at Herdsman Lake, inspiring over seven thousand visiting children a year.

Eric McCrum, naturalist, teacher and keen photographer, is known to many as 'The Birdman' on ABC radio, and is capable of imitating the call of almost any bird found in the Australian bush. He is also knowledgeable about the Noongar history of West Australian land, as well as Aboriginal language, such as relating to the place names of WA towns.

Eric received the Order of Australia Medal OAM and the also the Michael Chin Humanitarian Award for his services in environmental education, conservation, and natural history.

Since retirement, Eric continues to give talks and works to foster the care for, and protection of, the natural world through education.

This good news story started in July 2023 when the Sphinx Foundation received a letter with this request: *My name is Anoushka Gupta, I am 14 years old, and as a current Year 10 student at Perth Modern School, I am writing to ask if your organisation would consider assisting with sponsorship and donations for my team to represent Western Australia in the national DaVinci Decathlon competition.*

The DaVinci Decathlon is an international competition involving teams of eight students in each year group. In our school's first year of participation, our talented team of Year 10 Perth Modern Students won the State competition on the 10th of May, hence qualifying for the National competition in Sydney this September, which we are now diligently training for.

In this, we will be competing in two days of demanding academic challenges across 10 disciplines, comprising Mathematics, Science, Engineering, Art and Poetry, English, Cartography, Ideation (innovative ideas), Creative Production, Code Breaking and General Knowledge. We are a diverse team of hard-working and motivated thinkers, who are keen to enhance our abilities and tackle challenges. From participating in this challenge, we aim to equip ourselves as leaders of the future by thinking creatively, addressing a multitude of difficult "real-world" problems, and effectively collaborating in a dedicated team. We also strive to inspire younger students to widen their academic knowledge, stretch their abilities to their full potential and work effectively in teams.

As you can imagine, this is quite an exorbitant affair, and we are therefore pursuing multiple fundraising schemes to achieve our goal. However, we require some extra help to raise the money required for travel, accommodation, transportation, and incidental costs. In order for us to proudly represent Perth Modern School and the state of Western Australia in this prestigious competition, it would be greatly appreciated if you could consider providing us with a donation to help us achieve this goal. A sponsorship, or whatever can be donated, would be of great assistance.

In response, the Board of the Sphinx Foundation, with the valuable assistance of another donor, was very pleased to provide \$6,000 towards the team's travel costs to Sydney in September. From: Denis Wylks, student 1954-58 A "RIVAL" SCHOOL?

I have a suggestion for an article in a future newsletter. Having lived in Canberra since 1972, I am a bit out of touch with the latest events at the school, although I have attended a few Class of 58 reunions, up to 2018. I would like to find out what is going on with the new school that has appeared in the corner of the site. It appears to be a Modernian copy, named after a well known former student of Mod! Is it intended to replace our school and does its emergence have anything to do with the recent issue regarding the Principal's replacement? I am sure that there must be others amongst us who are wondering about these matters! That leads me to another question - I was interested to hear about a possible reunion event to be held in Melbourne for "eastern states" Modernians. Can I get my name on the mailing list? Denis

Ed: Always happy to consider new ideas for articles and bring back old memories. This email was forwarded to Dr Robyn White, Chair of the Perth Modernian Society Museum Association Board, who replied to Denis in the following terms:

The "rival" school?

You may remember that just before Mark McGowan was elected (in March 2017), The then Opposition Education Shadow Minister Hon. Sue Ellery outlined Labor's election policy to relocate the Gifted and Talented specialist school to 'Education Central' on the top six floors of a 22 storey building Northbridge. Presumably she assumed that returning the Roberts Road buildings to a comprehensive local high school would counter the extreme overcrowding at Churchlands SHS, and be appreciated by the Mt Hawthorn/North Perth population who had felt most



marginalised by the change of Perth Mod back in 2007 to a fully selective school for academic students.

The local, alumni and parent population around Perth was appalled - the many problems in locating a school amongst businesses etc sharing the building, lack of recreation space, lack of access (no parking area) plus the loss of the natural historic location with heritage buildings on the site persuaded the government not to create its 'inner city' school at Mod.

However, the issue for the government, was its perceived concern for education facilities for a city population (still stood at about 200 secondary school aged children) and the issue of Mt Hawthorn and its locality. There were then three great sites in the city that might have converted to a city school on its own secure site (the old Perth Girls High School, the old orphanage on St Georges Tce, and the under-utilised TAFE site on Royal St).

The government eventually (June 2017) bowed to public pressure and decided on a new comprehensive school to be built on Kitchener Park alongside Subiaco Oval (as the outdoor space and limited other space for two three-storied buildings). It's a great looking school. But it is on very limited space and will have up to 30 storeys apartment blocks alongside Hayden Bunton Drive in the next few years. It also requires about five buses to bring students from Mt Hawthorn etc to the school (a city site would have had direct access). Bob Hawke College opened in February 2020 and is the first high density public secondary college in Western Australia. It will eventually house about 2,000 students.

As far as Mod goes, the school admin has good relations with their colleagues - but there's not a lot of need for sharing etc - the school is well resourced. Hope this helps explain the new school.




With the book currently being printed, the date for the launch of the book has been set as:

LAURIE BEDFORD PMS teacher 1964-68

Hockey Australia is saddened to learn former Kookaburra Laurie Bedford has passed away at the age of 81. Laurie was the 194th player capped for Australia's Men's Hockey Team, one of 13 players to make their international debut on 13 August 1967 in the first match of a 3-test series in New Zealand. A legend of Cricketers Hockey Club in Perth, Laurie started playing at the club in in 1960, firstly at left wing and then at fullback. He was also a talented penalty corner taker. Laurie enjoyed great success at Cricketers HC during his 13 years at the club. Over that period, he represented Western Australia at Colts (U18 level) and Seniors before being selected for Australia. After competing in the 1967 Trans-Tasman series, according to Hockey Australis records Laurie also played in an international tournament in Lahore against East Germany, France and Kenya in1969. DR DAVID SYDNEY TEAKLE PMS student 1945-47

He played pennant squash for 15 years until serious back problems intervened in 1977. After recovery he took up running and successfully completed 26 mile marathons in 1980 and 1981. He was a member of the WA Marathon Club and Perth Football Club for leisure, and the Australian Society of Accountants and WA Institute of Management for business. His hobbies and interests included films, theatre, music, football, running and travel, taking a trip around the world in 1966, other trips to South East Asia and Japan. He married in 1967 and was father to one son and twin daughters.

TRAILBLAZERS OF YESTERYEAR

GEOFF (Ted) PENNY PMS Student 1955-56

Geoffrey (Ted) Penny was the first Aboriginal student known to attend Perth Modern School and the first in WA to matriculate. Ted was a School Prefect and Athletics Champion in 1956. He became a primary School teacher, a principal and advocate and advisor in Aboriginal education.

He was one of the inaugural Aboriginal alumni from Edith Cowan University where he is recognized as a "trailblazer in Aboriginal education". Belmont City College where he worked confirmed his sudden death in September 2014.

The following extracts on this page are from an interview with Ted Penny conducted by Sue Taffe on 27 May 1997:

Ted was the first Western Australian qualified indigenous teacher and the Western Australian state secretary of the Federal Council for Aboriginal Advancement in 1964. He went to Sydney for the launch of the national petition for a referendum in 1962 and was active in the West in support of a Yes vote. Here he compares conditions for Aboriginal people across the states in the 1960s.

WA and Queensland were perhaps a little worse than the others. It's hard to say. The people in Sydney and Melbourne have always been much more active, and so you hear more and it would sound as if it's worse because people are having a lot more to say. But I think in the beginning, people were much quieter in WA. That changes and there are a lot of people who are more vocal about it afterwards. But I suspect WA perhaps would have been as bad as any.

Ted helped people to understand what it meant to be an Aboriginal Western Australian in the early 1960s when he told people what happened when he decided to get married, 'I told Mum, but I asked the Commissioner (of Native Welfare).' He also pointed out that in his journey from Port Hedland to Canberra his status changed from being Aboriginal to not being Aboriginal and then back again as he crossed state borders.

One of the big things too was the definition of 'Aboriginal', and it was different in each state. So you could become an Aboriginal or a non-Aboriginal as you moved from state to state. And when I came through, we stopped in Melbourne. I came with a fellow and we went into a hotel, had our lunch down there, and it was legal for me to go in. And I went on to Canberra and I became an Aboriginal again, under the law, but I was never anything but an Aboriginal! And then later on, they brought in a legal definition, that I think has always applied to most people anyway; that if you know you're Aboriginal, and that's all there is to it.

And that's always been of concern to me in the way that that's been put across as, you know 'How Aboriginal are you?' No-one says to you: 'How Australian are you?' And the further back you can trace the generations of Australians, then the more Australian they are going to say you are. Now, the Aboriginal history goes back, back, back but the further you come away from there, they say you're less Aboriginal. It works in the reverse. Okay, so your grandparents were Aboriginal, but you've got a no-one said anything about the mixture of what you are in Australian.

Sue: Has that got better, do you think? Do you think people are still as ignorant or has it improved a bit?

Ted: Well, you see it depends. The people that you mix with don't normally say those things whenever it comes up. But a lot of people will still say: 'What part Aboriginal are you?' 'Well now, I think, my finger is', you know. I often say to them: 'Well, what part Australian are you?' 'Oh I'm a third generation Australian.' 'Well, what were your parents?' 'Well, one came from Germany...' 'So you're half German?' 'No, no, no, no'.

In 1998 Ted received the Barry Hayward Award for Outstanding Achievement for his work as Coordinator of Aboriginal Education in the Pilbara.




LÊ QUANG VINH LÊ QUANG VINH (VINH LÊ) PMS teacher

Author of THE LEGACY OF THE VIETNAMESE BOAT PEOPLE

The Commonwealth Government recently marked the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War with a nationally broadcast service in Canberra. It wasn't just soldiers who lost their lives in the war that started in 1955 but also civilians as the Viet Cong tried to unify the entire country under a single communist regime similar to that in China and the Soviet Union.

Vinh (Vinh Lê) is a Vietnamese refugee who arrived in Perth, Western Australia, in 1978. The Catholic Centrecare office sent him to Geraldton (419 kilometres north of Perth) to work as gardener at one of the Church's local colleges where he enrolled in night school to study English. After three months in Geraldton, Vinh returned to Perth where he worked as a teacher's aide at a State primary school. He studied for a Diploma in Teaching at Claremont Teachers' College and completed his Bachelor of Education in Major Social Studies. After graduating, he taught at Perth Modern School and Girrawheen Senior High School. Lê Quang Vinh lives with his partner in Perth, Western Australia, and now lectures part-time in Vietnamese studies at a local college of technical and further education.

From a recent published August 17, 2023 interview by Christopher Tan, for *PerthNow* – Stirling we learned that despite all the atrocities, Mr Le still remembers his "peaceful and beautiful little town" where he grew up in the south of Vietnam, about 70km from Saigon. It wasn't long after he went to Saigon when the communist group attacked the city. I was asked to go to military academy school where they actually treated us really well," he said. "Most of the officers had training in the US; some of them had been fighting for a long time and had a lot of experience."

The now 76-year-old, who finished up as a first lieutenant and commander in charge of an infantry regiment, said his troops fought until the very end. But unfortunately he was wounded and was hospitalised for two weeks.

"I was fighting on the front lines and then I saw dust approaching about 200m away. I thought that was really strange because during the battle there haven't been any cars, buses or other vehicles driving along," Mr Le said. "So I used my binoculars to observe, then ran back to my commander in charge and asked for a rocket to shoot as maybe the communists are located there? Then I heard the communist drop a rocket back behind me, so the fragments of that explosion were inflicted on me, including my left shoulder, and I was in very sharp pain." Mr Le was jailed by the Viet Cong and sent to the border near Cambodia. "And in there they ask us to dig wells every single day, to a specific length and depth," he said. "They told us that the government wanted to kill us, but not immediately. So instead, we needed to do some work for them."

When Mr Le was released from jail he could see the nation was in complete chaos, how poor the citizens were and how few jobs were available, so he decided to escape with his wife and two little children to Malaysia.

"About 1am in the morning, about 50km into our journey, we encountered a hurricane. This was a very big wave that threw our petrol tank out of the boat and into the ocean," he said. "So we didn't have enough petrol to continue our journey. And I actually prayed that we would arrive somewhere like an island because we nearly died."

And luckily they managed to make it back on shore, where a local fisherman helped organise the young family back into the waters. They ended up in Geraldton then Perth later on, where Mr Le eventually became a teacher.

"Life has been so much better since we got to Perth; it truly is one of the paradises in this world," he said. "If we had continued staying in Vietnam, I think we would've already died due to the poor situation and the terrible conditions of the communists reign."


MODERNIANS WHO DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY

Number 21 in a special series of articles researched and prepared for publication by Robert Johnson, PMS student 1961-65 and Museum Volunteer

Robert Edmund (Ed) Guthrie PMS Student 1928-29

Three Guthrie brothers served their country in World War Two. One came home, one rests in Germany and another lies in New Guinea. Their parents received two heart-breaking telegrams that every parent dreaded getting, one in 1942 and the other in 1943.

Ed Guthrie was born on 28 February 1913 to parents James Alexander Long Guthrie and Mary Elizabeth Guthrie (nee Smyth) of Claremont. He had an older brother, William James, a younger brother, Hugh Kitchener, and a younger sister. Ed attended Graylands Primary School, Claremont High School from 1925 to 1927 and Perth Modern School in 1928 and 1929. He played full-back in the school's First 18 Football Team in 1929 and passed his Leaving examinations at the end of that year.



Ed graduated from Claremont Teachers College in 1930 and worked as a teacher at Yuna South, Bo-Allia and Richmond schools before being appointed to the Central School in Claremont in 1940. Ed played eight matches for Claremont Football Club in 1936 and 1937 and married Irene Victoria Flegg, aged 25, in 1938. At some point during this time, he enrolled at UWA as an external student and was awarded BA posthumously.

Ed enlisted in the RAAF on 3 March 1941, having been granted leave by the Education Department. In 1941 he underwent pilot training at Pearce, Cunderdin and Geraldton. He passed his courses and was commissioned as a Pilot Officer on 20 October 1941.

After further training he was promoted to Flying Officer on 20 April 1942 and posted to No. 14 Operational Training Unit (OTU) at RAF Cottesmore at Rutland, near Leicester, on 5 May 1942.

Ed's last flight took place on Saturday 1 August 1942 when he and his three fellow crew members took off in Hampton bomber P5322 at one minute past midnight on a bombing mission to Dusseldorf in Germany. It was a "maximum effort" raid involving 630 aircraft, many of which were supplied by OTU's. This resulted in a high casualty rate due to the crews only being partly trained and having no experience in night bombing.

The OTU's lost 16 aircraft during the night, one of which was Ed's Hampton, shot down by the 7th Flak Division. The aircraft crashed in Cologne, 400 metres west of Cologne Cathedral. Ed and two other crew members, Sgt Charles McMullen, RAFVR, and Flight Sergeant Elwin Hunking, RCAF, were killed. Warrant Officer John Morrison, RCAF, survived. Ed is buried in Rheinberg War Cemetery, 45 kilometres north of Dusseldorf. He was 29 when he died.

Ed's younger brother, Hugh, an outstanding footballer, played 69 matches for Claremont between 1937 and 1941. He played in the successful premiership team in 1940 and won the Club's fairest and best award in 1941. He enlisted on 25 February 1942, served in the 2/28th Battalion and was killed in action at Scarlet Beach near Finschhaven in New Guinea on 20 October 1943 during the Salamaua-Lae Campaign. Ed's older brother, William, served in the RAAF and survived the war, passing away in 1999 at the age of 87. Ed's widow, Irene, moved to NSW during the war and later remarried. She died in 2012 aged 99.
