PERTH MODERNIAN SOCIETY ANNUAL ORATION

The Deputy Chief Executive of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO) Ms Kirsten Rose was the eminent speaker who presented the 2024 Modernian Oration. She spoke on the very current topic **'The art and science of navigating fake news and alternative facts'**.

Kirsten explained that although she worked at the CSIRO, she was not a scientist by training. She had studied art history and European history at university, subjects which gave her critical skills like analysing perspectives and questioning narratives. Both skills were relevant in her current role.

A strong point made by Kirsten in her half-hour delivery was that, 'Ultimately, curiosity and critical thinking are the tools that will help us navigate these challenges', and that, 'Being curious means going beyond what's presented at face value and asking: Where's the evidence? Who supports this? Why does it matter?' She challenged the students to 'Stay curious—but don't stop there. Use your curiosity to ask tough questions and actively combat misinformation.'

Kirsten ended her address with the advice, 'I know that your school motto means Knowledge is Power. I couldn't agree more, and my call to action for you is to use that power to help navigate the uncertainties of today and ask how we can build a better-informed society for tomorrow?'

The power of Kirsten's address provoked many questions from enthusiastic students the answers to which explored her topic more deeply.

The Oration was given in the Cyril Tyler Auditorium before an audience of Year 11 students, members of the Sphinx Society and their parents, Modernians and staff.

Kirsten took the opportunity to speak with individual students at morning tea which was served in the Sir Paul Hasluck Foyer. About to leave, three students cornered Kirsten with a final question, 'Why and how did an Arts person like you migrate across to Science?'

Kirsten sent a note to the Principal and Peter Farr with these gracious words:

I am so grateful for the opportunity to provide the oration and to meet the Modernians, members of the Sphinx Society and of course your phenomenal students. The students were absolutely fantastic, and their engagement and insightful questions were a testament to their interest and understanding of the topic. I flew to Canberra later in the week to front Senate Estimates — and I assure you, the questions from your students were more insightful and challenging than those from the Senators. Thank you again for the opportunity and please let me know if there's any way I — or CSIRO — can support the school in the future.

HISTORY

The tradition of the Annual Oration was inaugurated by the Hon. Justice Michael Kirby in 2011, and distinguished speakers since have included Modernians Janet Holmes à Court AC, Emeritus Professor Ross Garnaut AC, Elizabeth Gaines, Professor Shirley Randell AO, Professor Bruce Armstrong AM, His Excellency the Honourable Chris Dawson APM, and Eric McCrum OAM. It is organised each year by Modernian Fellow Peter Farr.

Garry Glover 1953-1955, sent this delightful message from England:

Dear Editor,

I have been receiving your/our Newsletter for many years. It arrives with great joy and interest for me and shines a light on that period of life where so much changes and the foundations are laid for what was then a future we could never predict. I visit the period of only the 3 years I attended PMS 1953-1955 as one of my most fortunate and memorable. It was due to a Soldier's Scholarship from North Perth State School (my father served in the Great War of 1914-18 in France). I was born 1940, he died from injuries in 1945 and Repatriation and Legacy supported my mother and me throughout. I remain eternally grateful and carry guilt as an all-Australian boy spending my gift as an ex-pat in the UK 1967 to the present. It has been said by old mates that the IQ of Australia went up when I left and the UK went down.

I can thank PMS in its contribution to my future and can now wallow in that past. Old friends such as Theo Bredemeyer of blessed memory are no more, I have a photo of 2F with all the names and wonder what happened; names such as Felix Spittel, Geoffrey (Geoff) Adam I recall with others as I now forget the names of colleagues I worked with in London. Mr Strauss, the sports master gave me a life-long love of cricket and Mr Sampson, the Head passed a comment "Don't you ever clean your shoes Glover?". I was meticulous following such a put-down and remain grateful as I do to Mr Anderson, our German teacher and others. Your email brings this all to life.

I was a parcel attached to my widowed mother and returned with her to Sydney attending Sydney Boys High School for 2 years 1956-57 and then did Medicine at Sydney University with House jobs at Sydney Hospital, failing the FRACS primary exam and then retaking it in London 1967 becoming a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons (FRCS) in 1969. Married with children I remained in the UK becoming an ENT Head and Neck Surgeon at Mt Vernon and Northwick Park Hospitals in London retiring 2005. My Eucalyptus Niphophila tree outside my study window can see me typing this email. I remain a proud Australian, forever grateful to what I was given at PMS as the foundation. Sadly a visit to my home-land is no longer a possibility, I was never a Pom although I confess to supporting them in cricket. If anyone remembers me, I wish you and share with you happy memories.

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MUSEUM MATTERS

The past term has been another busy time for our Museum volunteers. Activities on Monday mornings in the Museum have continued as donations of artefacts and visitors arrived. The book collection has now been completely catalogued and displayed on shelves. As **Gay Albillos** has worked with the extensive collection, she has discovered a number of damaged books. **Bob Crowe** (1957) has volunteered to mend these and last week received the first five books to be repaired. Gay now aims to create complete collections of Sphinx for the archive room and museum. The museum does possess a digital copy of all Sphinx magazines from 1914 to 2016. Sadly, not all year groups produced a Sphinx Yearbook.

Volunteers at the Museum enjoyed the opportunity to hear the school Annual Oration, organised by the Perth Modernian Society on Monday 4th November. A week later, the Remembrance Day ceremony conducted at the school cenotaph. The school's choir and orchestra added to the solemnity of the occasion.

Despite a year of intense activity there are always things that need to be done that remain undone. Any new volunteers are most welcome to join us on Monday mornings for good company, fascinating finds and an opportunity to preserve our valuable heritage.

As the weather warms and we begin to see Christmas decorations, our museum volunteers wish all Modernians a very happy and healthy festive season.

The Board meeting was very pleased to hear from board member Jeff Lai who reported that Ian Hunt (our IT volunteer extraordinaire) had stabilised the museum digital network and that all technology was functioning well. He also reported that Ian is very happy with the improvements that Ross Lovelady has envisaged for the museum student data-base. The Board thanked the museum volunteers and requested that they continue to work on current projects.

Campus Project

The Board of Perth Modern School recently determined that it was time to create a Campus Masterplan. This will focus on the school's current situation regarding grounds, buildings and encumbrances, strategically look to the challenges, opportunities and priorities and create a campus uplift strategy. The Board has contracted EIW Architects to work with the school community to create the masterplan. Sharon Williams and Robyn White attended an initial presentation by Philip Idle (EIW) in September and we were very pleased to see Philip plus his colleagues Chloe Summers and Reka Balogh visit the museum only a few weeks later. The team was able to interact with volunteers to better understand our activities and the extent of the collection – and to review the spaces in which we work. On request, the museum volunteers have written a 20-page "potted history" of the school to further inform the architects.

Our Museum volunteers and Board are incredibly proud of the beautiful book that records the history of the specialist music program at Perth Modern School and the musicians before and after. Jenny believes her father used these during his time at Mod. Does anyone have any recollection of fencing at Mod as a sport or club during 1952/53?

She informed us that her father's preferred sport was rugby which he fondly remembered playing. Evidently, in one hard fought match he broke his collarbone during a tackle but didn't realise it was broken until after the match! Roy married Barbara and was father to Bronwyn, Jennifer (Jenny) and Heather. Roy passed away peacefully in February of 2015.

Roy's twin brother, Murray (1952-53), also attended Mod and their father Roy Snr was also a Mod graduate (1919-1923). Roy is pictured on the right with Murray. Roy and Murray both attended their 50 year class reunion in 2003. All three, Roy Snr, Roy and Murray, became pharmacists.

TRIBUTES



DAISY HARRIES (née Spencer) PMS Student 1954-1958

Daisy Harries attended Perth Modern School between 1954 and 1958 but her links to Mod go far deeper in a way that is almost dynastic.

Her grandfather Walter Gardham was a manual training teacher at the school from its inception in 1911 to 1930. Her mother Marion was a Modernian as were her Aunt Lily and her Uncle Geoffrey. Grandchildren Cameron Harries and Rachel Harries also attended Mod. Daisy proudly sported a Mod numberplate on her car and she and husband Elwyn frequently made the trip from Bunbury to attend the Annual Reunion.


Daisy ranked well amongst the scholarship winners in her year and achieved a distinction for music. It was almost inevitable that she would become a highly regarded teacher of music and an enthusiastic supporter of activities musical.

Daisy spent most of her married life in the South West and taught music at schools in Bunbury and Busselton. But her influence went far beyond the classroom. She taught many students privately and was a driving force in the Bunbury Youth Chorale and the annual eisteddfod. So many tributes after her death recognized her contribution to a range of musical initiatives that enriched the city in which she lived.

Her support of her community went beyond music. She is fondly remembered for her active and enthusiastic contributions, often as an office bearer, to Bunbury Youth Care, the Country Women's Association, Probus, her local church, and the University of the Third Age.

RONALD (GUS) FERGUSON PMS Student 1947-1948

On graduation as an architect in 1955, Ron Ferguson, popularly known as Gus, won the Morawetz Travel Prize. It enabled him to spend time in Europe and Africa and then to work in London on the then new Barbican development. The ideas and experiences he absorbed informed many of the values that led to his becoming one of Western Australia's most distinguished architects. He wanted to produce buildings which were contextual, universal and enduring.



He came to prominence in 1961 when his innovative design for the Hale School Memorial Hall was accepted. It was the first time in Australia that off-form concrete had been used as a total and complete finish. The building attracted awards from the Architecture and Arts magazine and RIBA (Bronze Medal).

A commission to design the Law School at the University of Western Australia followed. Completed in 1967 the Law School established design values that have been repeated in twenty buildings across the campus, many of which feature his signature off-form concrete. In 2010 the Law School building was awarded the 2010 Australian Institute of Architects Enduring Architecture Award.



Gus was now regarded as the leading campus architect in the state and designed buildings for technical colleges and other universities including Murdoch. But his expertise was not limited to educational establishments. From 1970 and into the 1990's, Gus and his practice had responsibility for the redevelopment of housing on Rottnest Island (Wadjemup). The end result was the equal of any Mediterranean paradise. As part of his work, he documented the historic buildings on site and published two books about them.

In 1978 Gus was made a Life Fellow of the Royal Australian Institute of Architects and in 2000 was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Architecture by UWA. Aware that when young he had benefitted from the generosity of others, he provided for a generous travel scholarship for students of architecture.

JUDITH ALCOCK (née Wilson) PMS student 1954- 1958

Judith Ann Wilson, known as Judy, won a scholarship to Perth Modern School in 1954. Later that year she was the awarded the girls' Shell Scholarship, and presented with a bike, of which she was very proud.

At Mod, after a first year of general subjects, Judy chose the Science and Maths stream. On Matriculation Judy attended Graylands Teachers' Training College, and her first appointment in 1963 was at Avonvale Primary School, Northam. It was there she met Eric Alcock, also a young teacher, and they were married two years later.

Judy and Eric had three children, Paul, Peter and Kathy and were actively involved parents in all of their various activities. Judy was extremely organised and found time to give them a loving and stimulating environment.

Tragically Judy and Eric lost their daughter, Kathy on Christmas Eve. Judy threw herself into working on a voluntary basis to helping other parents who had lost children in drug related ways to come to terms with their grief. She accompanied them to court inquiries if required. Judy worked closely with the Palmerston Association for 23 years, and was on their Board for several years, having to retire from this dedicated work 9 years ago, due to ill health. After six years of medical consultations with many specialists, she was finally diagnosed as suffering from an unusual presentation of Motor Neurone Disease, in which her speech and fine motor movements were severely affected.

Judy died peacefully at Bethesda Hospital on May 13th, 2024, aged 81 years. She is sadly missed by her many family members and friends.

The Perth Modern School community extend their condolences to their former Principal, Eric Alcock, and his grieving family. Judy's peer group from the 1959 graduation year remember her as a fun friend, a loving mother and a caring and brave woman.

MAX WALTERS AM PMS student 1944-1948

Max attended medical school in Adelaide from where he graduated with distinction in 1948. He became a member of the Royal Australian College of Physicians in 1959. He worked within the pathology department at Royal Perth Hospital and in 1963 became a founder member of the Royal College of Pathology (UK) in 1963, and subsequently a Fellow of the Royal College of Pathology of Pathologists of Australia.

It is in the area of pathology that Max had his greatest impact. His expertise and potential were recognized by the Nuffield Foundation which granted him a Dominion Travelling Fellowship in 1964. In 1968 he was granted a US Public Health Service international postdoctoral fellowship which took him to Boston.

After a period as a lecturer in UWA's pathology department in 1971, Max became its professor of pathology. It was the time when all of the university's laboratory departments relocated from Royal Perth Hospital to the Queen Elizabeth II Medical Centre, providing Maxwith the opportunity to develop a combined academic and practical pathology service, a unique concept at the time.

He subsequently served as the dean within the faculty of medicine and upon advisory boards, panels and research foundations.

That Western Australia enjoys diagnostic pathology services of outstanding quality, may be attributed to the teaching, inspiration and mentoring provided by Max.

Max was a great contributor, especially within the Jewish community. He was a member of the group which established the Carmel School in 1958 and in 1978 became the president of the Western Australian Jewish Board of Deputies. He was instrumental in reinvigorating a number of communal institutions and mounted a rescue operation when the synagogue was facing difficulties in the 1990s.

Max volunteered for the Citizen Military Forces and in 1959 became a major in the Royal Australian Army Medical Corps. He held the position of deputy director of army health, Western Command and regimental medical officer for the 1st Royal Western Australia Regiment.

In 1998 Max was made a Member of the Order of Australia for his service to medicine and education, particularly in the field of pathology, to medical research and to the community.

PERTH MODERN SCHOOL AND THE GREAT ESCAPE

Jill Thomson was a student at Modern School from 1959 to 1963 and was one of 55 former students who attended the 60th reunion on Saturday 7 October, 2023. She is in the front row, second from left.

When she was a youngster at Wembley Primary School in the 1950's, a teacher came up to her and said, "You have a lot to be proud of in your father, he is a very brave man." The teacher was Stan Payne who was in Stalag Luft 3 with Jill's father, Stan Thomson.



Jill's father gave her a photo taken in 1944 in Stalag Luft 3, a prisoner of war camp near Sagan in eastern Germany immortalised in the film *"The Great Escape"*. The photo was of her father and 10 of his fellow POW's or Kriegies, most of whom were from WA.



Stan Thomson is 2nd from the left and Stan Payne is 6th from the left. Two Old Modernians have also been identified in the photo, Keith Murdoch (second from the right in the slouch hat) and Reg Spear (fourth from the left).

Keith Alexander Murdoch was born in Kalgoorlie in 1914 and attended Modern School from 1927 to 1931. He graduated from UWA with a Diploma in Commerce in 1936 and intended to become an accountant. Keith worked for the Perth Roads Board when he enlisted in the RAAF in June 1940. He married Marjorie Thomas later that year.

Keith trained as a fighter pilot in WA, Canada and England and was posted to 450 Squadron in Egypt on 6 June 1942 flying P40 Kittyhawks. Three weeks later on 26 June during his ninth flight on operations, his aircraft was shot down near Mersa Matruh in Egypt. He was captured and sent to Stalag Luft 3. He was promoted to Flight Lieutenant during his captivity and was discharged from the RAAF on 27 November 1945. He served in the RAAF Reserve until 1960 and died in Mosman Park on 10 August 1965 at the young age of 51.

Reginald Sydney Spear was born in Leederville in 1911 and attended Modern School from 1924 to 1928. He would have been in 4th Year when Keith was in 1st Year. He was a school prefect in 1928, a keen sportsman and a Bronze Medallion surf lifesaver. He graduated from Claremont Teachers College in 1931 and taught at several schools before he enlisted in the RAAF on 3 February 1941.

Reg trained as a navigator in South Australia and was sent to the UK in October 1941 for night bomber training. He was posted to 104 Squadron in Egypt in June 1942 and on the night of 12/13 July, his Wellington bomber was shot down over Tobruk. Reg was captured and sent to Stalag Luft 3. After three years as a POW, he was released on 2 May 1945 and flown to England. Now a Flight Lieutenant, Reg stayed in the RAAF until 1948. He moved to Victoria, married Elizabeth (Liesl) Gartenberg and raised a family. Reg died in 1980 aged 68.

Stan Thomson was also in a Wellington which was lost on a raid to Tobruk, force-landing south of Sidi Barrani in the desert on the night of 19/20 August 1942, five weeks after Reg's capture. A navigator, he was on his 24th operational flight. He went back into the burning aircraft to retrieve the crew's life-saving water supplies. Stan returned home as a Flight Lieutenant in late 1945 and had three children with Molly. Jill was the second of two girls. Her older sister, Robyn, attended Modern School from 1954 to 1958. Stan and Molly were invited to the Perth premiere of "The Great Escape" in 1963. After arriving home, Stan said ruefully and with a half-smile, "I didn't know there were that many Yanks in the prison." Stan died in 1985 aged 72.

Stan Payne enlisted in the RAAF in January 1941. He was serving as an air gunner in 106 Squadron on a raid on Leipzig on the night of 19/20 February 1944 when his Lancaster was shot down over Germany by a night fighter. He baled out, was captured and taken to Stalag Luft 3. Stan returned home a Flight Lieutenant and was discharged in January 1946. He resumed teaching and became a headmaster in 1976. Stan died in 1984 aged 64.

Another veteran in the 2023 reunion photo is **Noel Bell** who served in the infantry in Vietnam in 1967 and 1968. Noel is in the rear row, third from the left.
